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SOME FAVORITE CHILDREN'S BOOKS FOR LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT

I choose books for speech and language teaching that have one or more of these qualities that not only promote communication skills but also early literacy skills: rhyming; repetitive sentence patterns; just a few words on each page (words highlighted in some way); target language patterns such as past tense verbs or adjectives; target sentence patterns such as questions; vocabulary-builders; target phonological patterns (speech sounds); fun, important content or teaches a character trait.

It's great for parents to have a variety of books in their libraries-including wordless books. Wordless books allow the child to be creative or possibly to remember how they heard the story. Of course, children love books with flaps to open or tactile components to touch!
